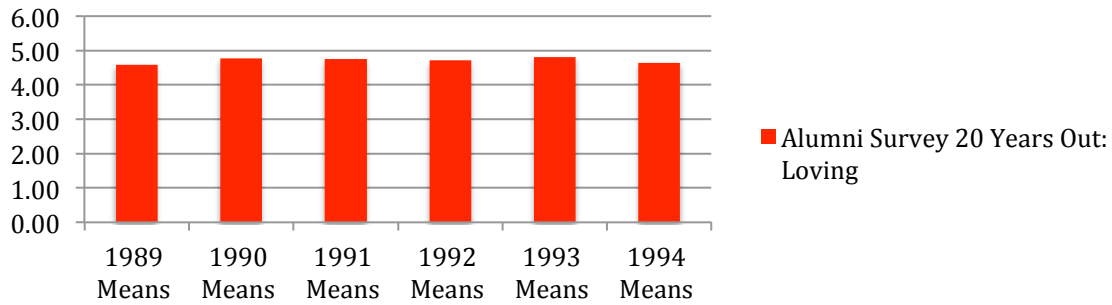

Class of 1994 Responses to: How important are the needs of your local and global communities? Is that connected to your personal faith?

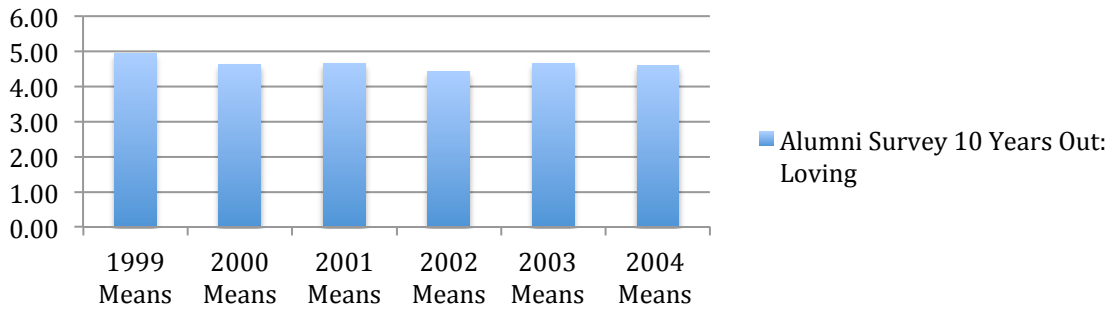
- Absolutely. We are connected.

All needs have the potential to be fulfilled, and our choice of action can be to fulfill them or not. Unmet needs can sustain themselves for a short while, but then grow to overwhelming proportion. I believe when we fulfill other's needs, we are actually filling our own.
- At this point in my life, my focus is on family and career to do my absolute best in those two areas. I do look forward to having more time to focus on my communities once my children are grown and my career goals are met which should happen in the next decade or so.
- Both are critical, but I do not feel physically connected to the global community at this time. I hope to do more for my local community as I get older and have more free time.
- Both are important in theory, but practically speaking, the needs of my local community come first.

Class of 2004 Responses to: How important are the needs of your local and global communities? Is that connected to your personal faith?

- Again, I'm guessing not a lot of folks will go with the "Not very important" answer. The fact that I find these needs important doesn't really have much at all to do with faith in the God sense - they're aren't important just because God says so.
- As a servant of the church, I see the church as bearing witness to God's love for the whole world through Jesus Christ in the context of local communities. Thus, by drawing local communities to God through loving service, we witness to God's power to transform the world, which we also do by contributing some of our financial and other resources to global mission and relief efforts.

- I see the needs of my community as very important and do connect that to my personal faith.

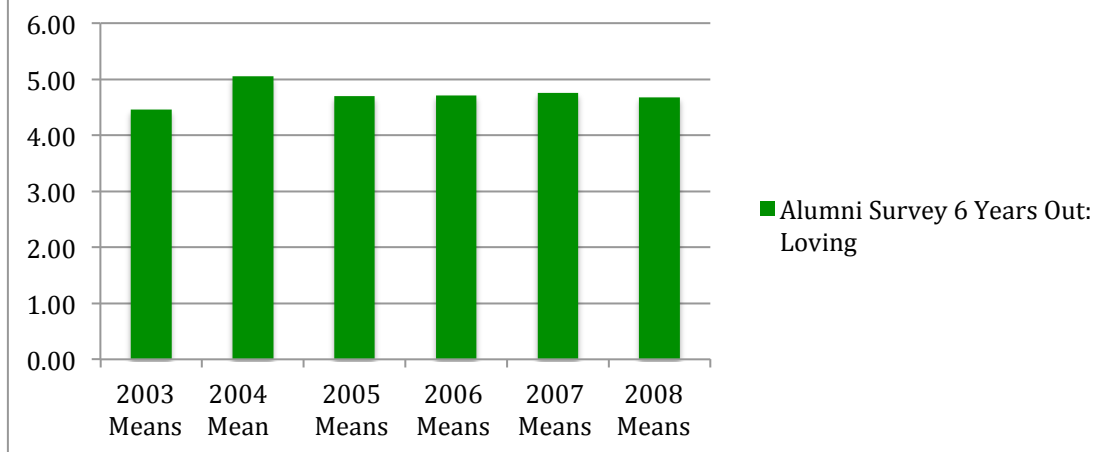
- I think they're very important, but not necessarily connected to faith

Class of 2008 Responses to: How important are the needs of your local and global communities? Is that connected to your personal faith?

- As each generation passes, global inter-connectedness increases exponentially. Soon we will all share the same problems, such as climate change, over population, etc. No connection to faith.
- Both the needs of my local and global communities are very important. It is easier to work locally, but more beneficial to think globally. Different communities have different beliefs and needs...
- Faith? Not so much. The needs of my local community seem overwhelming enough as it is, let alone the thought of the global necessities.
- Helping others is something I've recently taken on as a new life goal. I haven't done much for my community since SI, but it is important to me and is something I hope to work on moving forward.
- I am applying to medical school so that I can care for my fellow human beings. I have volunteered abroad at an eye clinic to the same end. I do not personally feel that faith is a necessary impetus to do good. That said, if other people are inspired into action by their faith, then I am thankful that they have that force of good in their lives.
- I am still trying to understand the needs of my local and global communities. they need books and as a clerk at a bookstore, I can help them to find those. they need food, and as a busser at a restaurant, I bring it to their tables. these things, however, are luxury items. and I want, through my writing, to provide intellectual nourishment. a thing I feel is essential to life on earth. If that feeling is a faith, then yes, the two are connected.
- I don't really see helping others as a reflection of personal faith; more as a reflection of the person and his/her character. I see the needs of my local community as more important because there is more I can do to help.

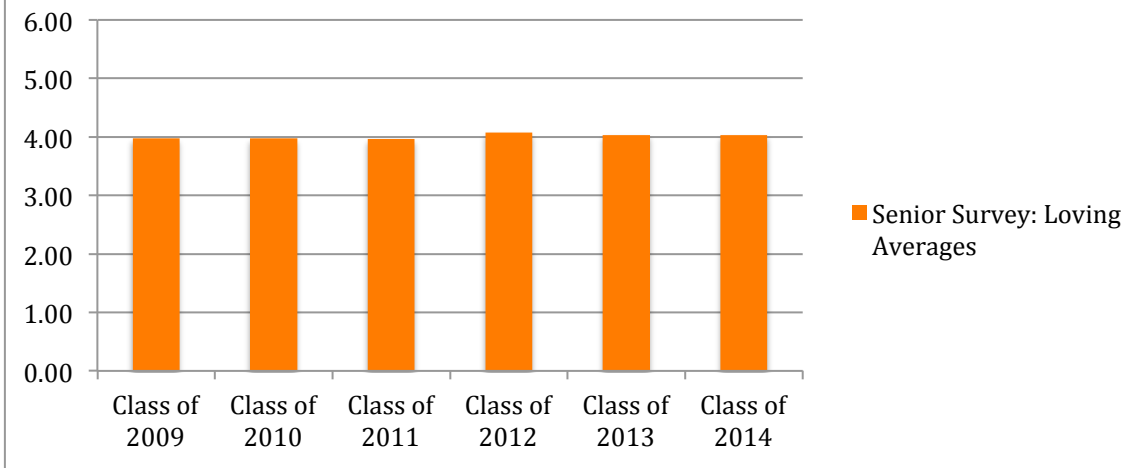

- With today's technology-fueled fast pace life I have to force myself to think of others beyond myself. Without my personal faith I would take even less interest in needs of local and global communities.
- Working in the mission district of SF, I have discovered a very different culture in comparison to where I grew up in Burlingame. I feel a stronger sense of community here which may attribute to its history and background.
