

friends, laughter. Each day He gives me strength/nourishment to be in service.


- Blessed to have a happy & healthy family.

- Currently, by my education and career choice as I find God's grace in medicine and seeks God's guidance when I need patience with my patients.



As my world has expanded beyond SI and San Francisco the tie between God and faith and religion has weakened. I still have many interactions where I share a mutual understand of God with those around me but as I moved beyond the Jesuit and San Francisco communities I have less and less relationships where notions of faith and relationships are the same. In some senses this has reinforced a faith that is declining while not necessarily eroding a healthy relationship with God.

Class of 2008 responses to: How is God's love evidenced in your life?

- A difficult question. Part of me finds pieces of God's love and beauty in the untainted realms of nature. Other times I read, hear or see the anger and evil in the world and it makes me feel like our universe is spiraling out of control. At times I feel like I struggle with seeing the love.
- A note to the above questions: My Jesuit education has been invaluable to my personal development and spirituality. However, I don't affiliate myself with a parish, but rather a school of Islamic Sufism. I feel that all of life is an experience of God's love. Our challenge is to become aware of this reality.
- After the sudden and tragic loss of a close family member the summer before my junior year of college, I stumbled on my faith journey. I was angry and after years of challenges and loss, this was the breaking point. I attended a Jesuit university and found that no matter how confused and angry I was, I still kept writing AMDG at the top of every paper I turned in. It was a habit that started at SI and I continued, somewhat subconsciously, while at Santa Clara. It struck me one day that no matter how dark my journey was, God was still there, calling me back. The fall of my senior year, a dear friend was diagnosed with cancer. In those first few weeks before he was transported back to his home town, I found myself attending daily mass. My feelings of anger and betrayal settled and I found that my faith was where I had left it - in the care of four little letters ingrained in my paper header. It was the Jesuit community that gave me the space I needed, and welcomed me back with open arms.
- Although I don't completely discount the possibility there is a greater power than us, I don't believe in the Christian idea of God. Friends and family are the closest thing I can say to respond to this question, though I don't believe "God" had anything to do with either
- Closeness with family and friends. Kindness in working with people everyday
- Compassion, decomposed, is the sharing in the passion (suffering) of another. I try to remember that Christ is with me in my pain/trials, and that I am called to be present to others in theirs. Also, I find greater fulfillment in aiming for joy (through compassionate helping/presence to others) than striving for happiness.

- God's presence is overwhelming in my life. Since SI, my understanding of the relationship I can have with God has grown significantly despite lack of faith in an organized parish.


- I am a non-believer.

- My family, friends, classmates, professors, patients, and interactions with all sorts of people.
- My friends (many of them from SI) and family.
- My friends, my family, the opportunities I've had.
- My mom and dad's faith.
- My sister got cancer, my dad has twice been hospitalized for suicidal ideation, my other sister has a lifelong struggle with eating disorders, confidence issues, and anxiety, I broke my neck, and my mother has had to hold us all together, which I'm sure has been taxing on her psyche. So, I choose not to believe in god, because if he does exist he is a complete and total dick.
- One example: time and again I have had patients and patients' families tell me how kind, supportive, and "present" I have been with them and their loved ones. We regularly have a number of hospice patients in the unit I have been working in the past two years, and apparently I have made a difference in the passing of these people. That is one example, and the most meaningful (for me) example of how God has been working through me.
- Taking the Jesuit perspective - I try and see God in all things. From that I believe God's love is evidenced in my interactions with others.
- That God continues to love me even though I am a sinner. And that God gave mankind His Son as a gift for eternal life to rescue us. Furthermore, He has given us the Holy Spirit to be with us on this Earth.
