IMMERSION: GLIMPSES INTO THE SENIOR SUMMER

For many seniors, their 1-2 week immersion experience remains the pinnacle of their summer; it allowed them to continuing their SI exposure into themes such as Catholic Social Teaching, sustainability, and the immigration crisis. This year's immersion program, featuring 70 students and 18 adult leaders, was able to rebound to its full size as a result of lessened COVID restrictions. There were 8 immersion groups: Tacoma, Las Cruces, Tenderloin, Kansas City, El Salvador, Wheeling, and Camden. Each group, while focused on radically different social justice themes, practiced a commitment to faith, community, and simple living. The lead-up to the immersion experience this summer also featured a particularly packed schedule with multiple "discernment" evenings and a post-trip retreat for immersion groups to reconnect following their experiences.

Words cannot describe how grateful I am that I was given the opportunity to immerse myself in the Camden, New Jersey community. From getting to know the amazing people I lived with for a week, to the eye opening lessons I was taught about urban poverty and social Justice issues in our society, I truly feel that this experience has positively impacted and inspired me for years to come.


